Daniel Foreman is an award-winning Métis writer, director, musician and producer who creates independent film and video.



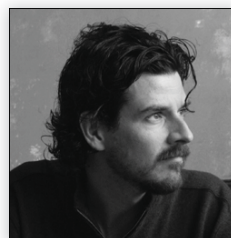
Michelle Latimer

Indigenous explorers go back to basics to experience life as their ancestors once lived

Merchants of the Wild mixes survival, nature and adventure, as six indigenous adventurers learn what it takes to complete a fur trade mission similar to the ones their ancestors would have endured in Northern Canada over 400 years ago.

Travelling in birch bark canoes, the brave group is taught by Elders and 'Knowledge Keepers', learning to make tools and use skills passed on orally through generations. These teachings are essential to their survival, as they take to the land with no modern technology on a voyage that will leave them forever changed.

The diverse group must survive for 25 days, using their collective knowledge and courage to find food, make shelter, endure freezing nights and battle an emotional journey to reconnect them with the land of their forefathers.

NOTE: This 13-part series is filmed over the course of a 25-day journey. Ideally it is watched in sequence, however, individual programs have a specific focus and can be watched individually if you are wishing to focus on specific themes.

By and large, Canadians' opinions about the Indigenous people of this country are formed without any knowledge of the culture's true history or firsthand experience of the present-day communities. This may explain the prevalence of racist, unsympathetic and generally prejudicial attitudes that are often directed towards this community. *First Contact* takes six Canadians on a 28-day journey intended to challenge these attitudes and shed a light on the true Indigenous experience. The Hidden Story Behind Vancouver's Twin Peaks

From Canadiana Series

"The Lions", twin peaks towering over Vancouver, have given their name to many BC places and things; but Joe Sa7plek and Mary Lixwelut Capilano, leaders of the Squamish (Skwxwú7mesh) Nation, knew these peaks as the Two Sisters. Settlers replaced traditional place names across Canada with names from their homelands. These twin peaks reminded John Hamilton Gray of the British lions in London's Trafalgar Square, and the new name persisted. Settlers displaced the Squamish ("skohomish") people, and almost obliterated their culture, but the name Capilano (anglicized version of Kia'palano) is found today all over Joe and Mary's traditional territory. Joe Capilano tirelessly campaigned for native rights in the late 19th century, at the same time as Pauline Johnson, a Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) mixed race poet from Southern Ontario, toured with her popular stage performances. She met Joe Capilano in London where he was petitioning King Edward, and when she retired in Vancouver, the Capilanos shared traditional Coast Salish stories with her. Her last book, "The Legends of Vancouver", recorded the story of "The Two Sisters": twin sisters brought peace and brotherhood to two warring nations by inviting their enemies to a celebratory potlach, and the Creator preserved their memory on the nearby mountain crest.
