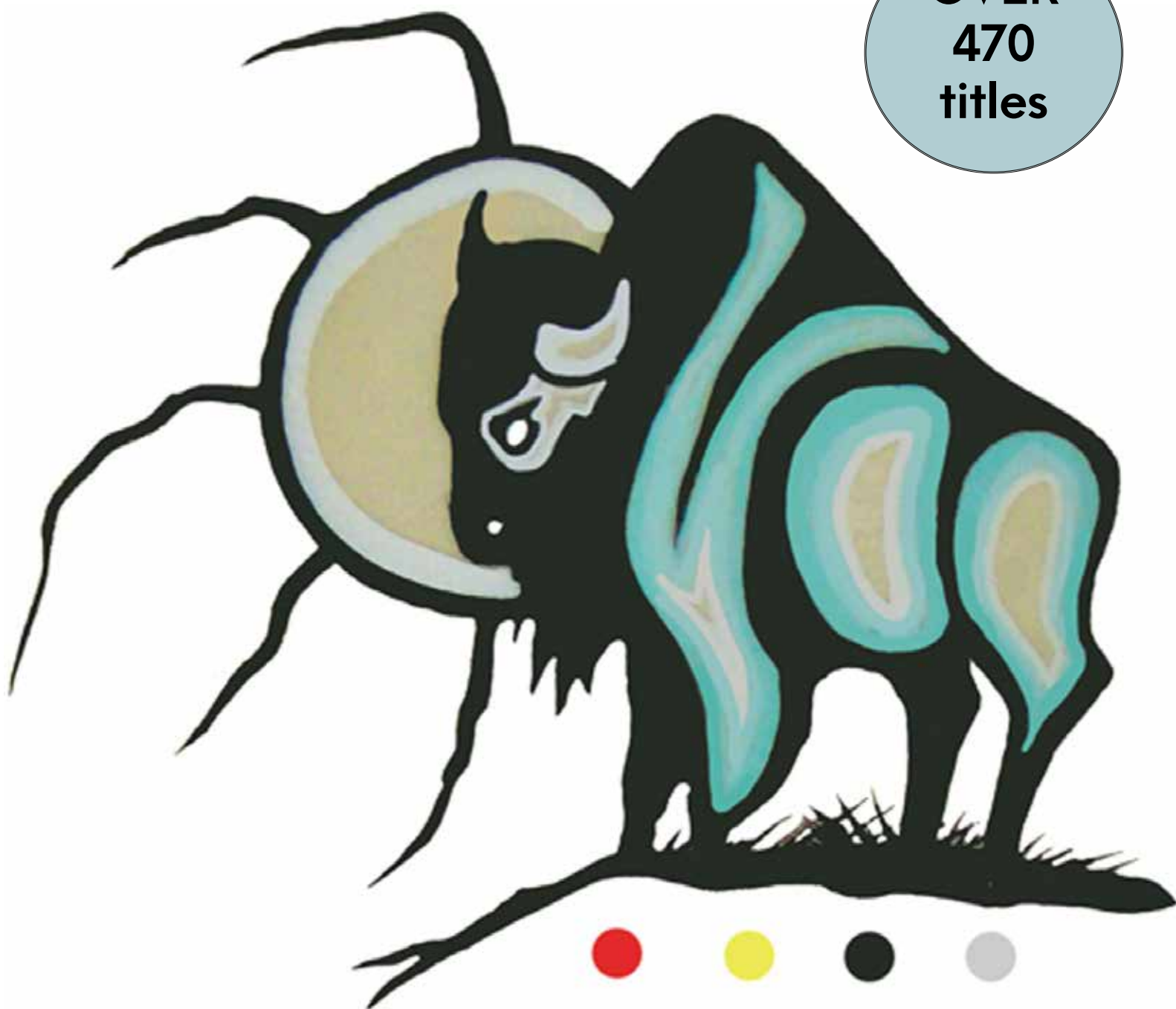

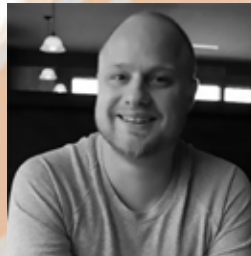

The Seven Sacred Laws is a colourful and imaginative animated series that follows a young boy on an Indigenous rite of passage: a vision quest. On his spiritual journey, he meets seven sacred animals that teach him how we as people should live our lives on Mother Earth.

Written by Anishinaabe Elder, Dr. David Courchene, directed by Indigenous filmmaker, Erica Daniels of Peguis First Nation, and created by Manitoba's Peg City Pictures Inc., the vignettes tell the stories of Indigenous Peoples in their own voices.

The Seven Sacred Laws are important teachings in our cultures as the Original People of Turtle Island. They are ancestral values that inspire our conduct as human beings and bring us back to a relationship with the Earth.

Includes the following episodes:

Episode 1: The Creation Story - A young boy sets out on a vision quest in a sacred place known as Manito Api, which translates to "where the Creator sits".

Episode 2: Buffalo (Respect) - An apparition of a buffalo emerges from the sacred fire and teaches the boy the law of respect.

Episode 3: Eagle (Love) - A large eagle appears overhead to teach the law of love.

Episode 4: Bear (Courage) - A bear emerges from the woods and startles the boy, as he learns about the law of courage.

Episode 5: Sabe (Honesty) - A large and imposing creature similar to Bigfoot appears and teaches the boy about honesty.

Episode 6: Beaver (Wisdom) - A beaver scurries up to the boy to provide the law of wisdom.

Episode 7: Wolf (Humility) - The boy is approached cautiously by a wolf, who explains to him the value of humility.

Episode 8: Turtle (Truth) - A beautiful song draws the boy to a special encounter with a turtle, who helps him understand the importance of truth.

This series follows the adventures of Joe, Nina and Buddy as they play outdoors, learn about nature and do good deeds to help their community of Turtle Bay. Joe, Nina and Buddy are inspired and empowered by the universal values of the traditional **Seven Sacred Teachings** and their spirit animals of Wolf, Lynx and Bear that connect them to their Anishinaabe culture. On completing everyday challenges, they are rewarded with a deeper understanding of these teachings in a fun way that will resonate with kids around the world. Wolf Joe also shares Ojibwe language, empowers kids to play outside and demonstrates many important human values.

The writing team included Indigenous storytellers, the series has an all-Indigenous cast of characters and voice actors (all Métis and First Nations) who were directed by Indigenous dialogue directors. Music for the series was provided by Justin Delorme, Indigenous musician and composer. Guidance was provided by Elder Dr Dave Courchene Nii Gaani Aki Inini (Leading Earth Man) Anishinaabe Nation, Eagle Clan, Turtle Lodge Founder.

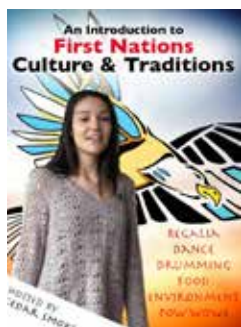

AMY'S MYTHIC MORNINGS

Grades JK-3 2014 22 min each

Amy's Mythic Mornings is a fun and innovative animated series that teaches problem solving and moral guidance through traditional knowledge from Indigenous storytelling. Six-year-old Amy and her friends Theodore and Casey bring the lessons to life when they imagine themselves in the rich stories told by Amy's Grandmother. Each episode contains a series of lessons for children to learn, as well as sing-a-longs, and a collection of original songs. **Created by Delores Smith and Darryl Whetung, an award-winning Ojibway film, television and documentary editor/producer.**

Thunderbird and Orca (Coast Salish)

Amy and her friends Theodore and Casey go on an adventure to stop the greedy whale from devouring the entire sea! On the way, they are saved by the mythical Thunderbird who flies them high in the skies! Thunderbird and Orca teach the children that learning to share may be the best way they can all live in harmony. In addition, skids learn more about the thunderbird and the Cowichan people.

The Young Girl and the Geese (Ojibway)

Amy makes a deal with the geese to fly south with them for the winter. She builds herself goose feather wings and announces to everyone to "look" at her. When everyone is watching, Amy crashes down, breaking the ice below. Alone, she learns that being the best is not as important as being with friends and family. Viewers also learn about turtles, and the Ojibway people, plus hear two original songs from Kimmy Alexander and Douglas Proulx.

Raven Steals the Sun (Haida)

Amy, Casey and Theodore meet an unusual boy who is on his way to his village. The chief has stolen the sun and has absolute power over night and day. The kids and their new friend convince the Chief to play a "riddle" game show, with the winner receiving the gift of the sun. The lesson learned is not to steal. In addition, viewers learn about what the Raven symbolizes for the Haida culture, fun facts about beavers, the Haida Gwaii culture and two original songs from Kimmy Alexander and Douglas Proulx.

Wild Woman of the Woods (Namgis)

This episode teaches kids important lessons about listening through a story from the Namgis culture. The wild woman of the woods captures the children to take them to live in her home forever. Theodore finds the courage to rescue them, but not without a little help from Mouse Woman. Includes segments on the significance of totem poles and fireflies.

Amy, Casey and Theodore find themselves on an arctic adventure trying to help a young bear cub, named Keyush return home to his mom after he gets lost with them. The group uses Inukshuk markers as clues to find their way back home. The lesson learned is, always tell someone where you are going. In addition, viewers learn about inukshuks and as well as Inuit territory and people.

Spirit Bear and Children Make History tells the true story of a landmark human rights case for First Nations children at the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal and how Spirit Bear and his friends stood with First Nations children and helped make **Jordan's Principle** a reality. In January 2016, nine years after the case was filed, the Tribunal ruled that the government of Canada was racially discriminating against 165,000 First Nations children by underfunding child welfare and failing to provide equitable public services. This complex subject is told through the perspective of a small white teddy bear, Spirit Bear.

This resource is a powerful account of a justice issue involving First Nations children by explaining Jordan's Principle and demonstrating how all children can work for fairness and reconciliation.

Grades 1-5 2018 40 episodes x 7 min ea Apartment 11 Productions

Raven's Quest features first-person profiles of Indigenous kids from across Canada. Each episode showcases a different child and their unique perspective on their day-to-day hobbies, their talents, and First Nations, Métis or Inuit practices. Their adventures include: snowboarding and making cedar-bark bracelets in British Columbia, cooking wild rice pudding in Ontario, lobster fishing in New Brunswick and drum-making and a visit with some rare white buffalo in Manitoba.

At first glance, this series appears to be just a collection of stories about First Nation children. However, what emerges is a compilation that challenges the audience to rethink what they assume about First Nations. As children learn about this topic and as it is mandated by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, this series becomes an imperative for schools to share and feature in their collections. The series introduces children to the diversity of Indigenous communities, showing the different languages, territories and traditions of each nation. It breaks down stereotypes and presents the lives of Indigenous peoples in a positive light.

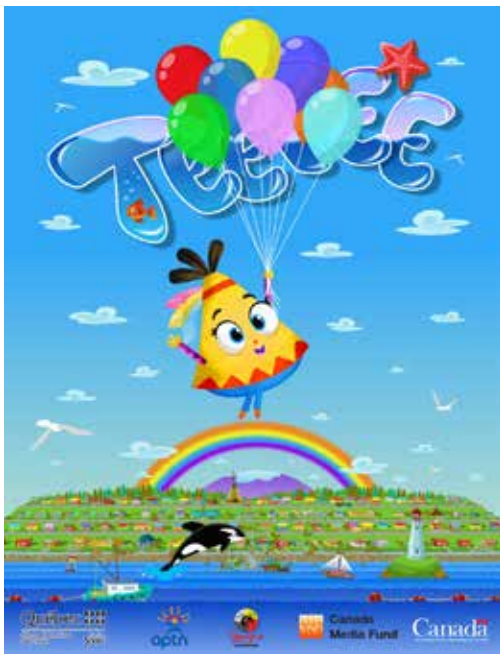

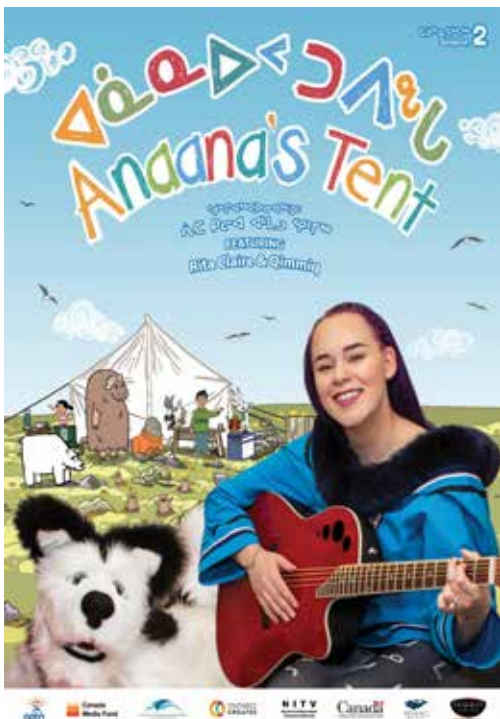

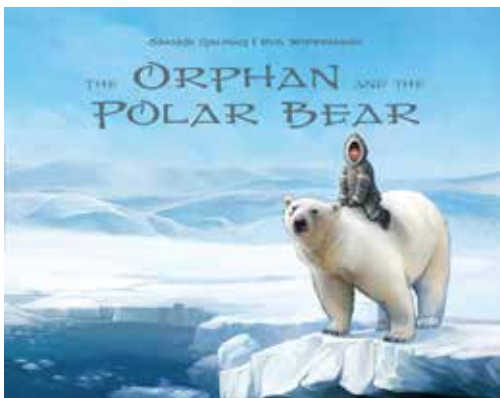

Picking Up the Pieces: The Making of the Witness Blanket

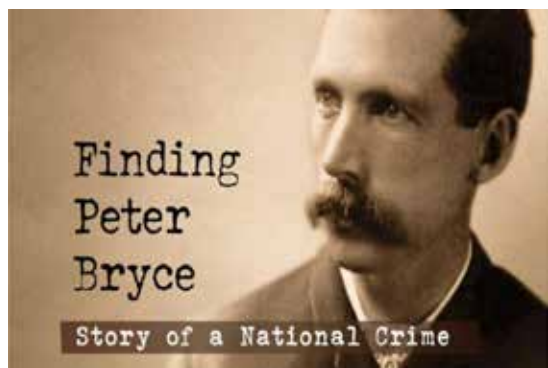

The Witness Blanket stands as a national monument to recognize the atrocities of the Indian residential school era, honour the children, and symbolize ongoing reconciliation. In an attempt to honour the more than 150,000 victims of the Canadian residential-school system, including his own father, artist Carey Newman embarks on a long journey to create the Witness Blanket. This large-scale art installation, inspired by the woven blanket's symbolization of protection in Indigenous cultures, features hundreds of artifacts gathered from former residential school sites, churches, government buildings and other affiliated structures.

Picking Up the Pieces: The Making of the Witness Blanket follows Newman and his team as they travel across Canada to meet survivors and collect these pieces of history. Through these survivors' testimonies, the documentary offers a crucial account of the atrocities committed in government-funded, church-run schools—and the lasting effects those acts have had on Indigenous communities.

BIO: Carey Newman or Hayalthkin'geme is a multi-disciplinary artist and master carver. Through his father, he is Kwakwak'awakw from the Kukwekum, Giiksam, and WaWalaby'ie clans of Fort Rupert, and Coast Salish from Cheam of the Sto:lo Nation along the upper Fraser Valley. Through his mother he is English, Irish, and Scottish.

He became an online force as he released song after song and video after video, that shared that story with mainstream North America and across the globe. He had the honour of opening Canada's Truth and Reconciliation process at a Winnipeg event along with Blue Rodeo and performed his critically acclaimed song *Living Proof* that illustrated the horrors of Canada's Residential School system.

Indigenous explorers go back to basics to experience life as their ancestors once lived

Merchants of the Wild mixes survival, nature and adventure, as six indigenous adventurers learn what it takes to complete a fur trade mission similar to the ones their ancestors would have endured in Northern Canada over 400 years ago.

Travelling in birch bark canoes, the brave group is taught by Elders and 'Knowledge Keepers', learning to make tools and use skills passed on orally through generations. These teachings are essential to their survival, as they take to the land with no modern technology on a voyage that will leave them forever changed.

The diverse group must survive for 25 days, using their collective knowledge and courage to find food, make shelter, endure freezing nights and battle an emotional journey to reconnect them with the land of their forefathers.

NOTE: This 13-part series is filmed over the course of a 25-day journey. Ideally it is watched in sequence, however, individual programs have a specific focus and can be watched individually if you are wishing to focus on specific themes.
