





The award-winning series, *Stories from the Seventh Fire* was inspired by a prophecy from an Ojibway elder who foretold of a time when we would seek out these stories and old teachings to reconnect with Mother Earth. The four half-hour episodes of Stories from the Seventh Fire are represented by the four seasons. Using animated characters, creatures, and landscapes based on the work of renowned Aboriginal artist Norval Morrisseau, the series features the voices of some of Canada's best-loved Indigenous performers including Ashley Callingbull, Tantoo Cardinal and Gordon Tootoosis.

WINTER

Tales of Wesakechak: Why the Rabbit Turns White Weshakechak neglects his responsibilities and is punished by the Creator. Without his powers, Wesakechak must embark on a journey to set things straight. Every creature is a part of nature's harmony. Wesakechak has become lazy and has not fulfilled his duties of making sure his people respect the land and the animals.

Wolf Tale: Legend of the Spirit Bear Mother Wolf tells of a time of eternal winter when all creatures were starving. Looking after our environment will ensure the

safe keeping for all.

SPRING

Tales of Wesakechak: The First Spring Flood
A story about the power of friendship and co-operation. In the time before there were people on Turtle Island (North America), the Creator put the shape-shifter Wesakechak on the earth to take care of all the creatures. This makes Machias, a bad spirit, very envious and angry. The power of friendship and co-operation is the theme in this spring story. Wesakechak must overcome the envy and anger of the bad spirit, Machias, who intends to drown him in the First Spring Flood. His friends Jackfish, Goose and Beaver cooperate to save him from the jealous bully.

Wolf Tale: Legend of the Giant Beaver Mother Wolf tells her cubs a story about a giant beaver who learned to adapt and create wetlands in a time when the great plains were covered by water. (Inspired by a story from the Peace River Dene).

SUMMER

Tales of Wesakechak: How Wesakechak Got His Name Wesakechak hates his name and convinces the Creator to give everyone new names hoping he can receive a better name than the one he already has. An excellent lesson in humility and working for stature! Wesakechak feels he deserves a more powerful name. He convinces his fellow creatures to ask the Creator to give out new names.

Wolf Tale: Legend of the Caribou

Mother Wolf tells her cubs a bedtime story about the truth of power and size. The cubs learn about animals and the world to the North in the Barrens, about how too many living in one place can destroy the land. (Inspired by the annual migration of the Porcupine Caribou herds).

AUTUMN

Tales of Wesakechak: Wesakechak and The Medicine This is a cautionary tale about respecting the power of medicine. Abusing medicine can be very dangerous!

Wolf Tale: Legend of the First Thanksgiving Mother Wolf tells her cubs a bedtime story about how the first Thanksgiving was created. (Inspired by a story from the Salish of the Pacific Coast).

Canot cocasse met en vedette les voyageurs franco-métis, une communauté qui a considérablement contribué à façonner l'histoire de notre pays. Dans cette série jeunesse, un canot magique et multiforme entraîne une joyeuse bande de campeurs curieux de tout et leurs deux intrépides moniteurs dans des aventures extraordinaires et sans limites. Naviguant une foule d'univers, ils découvrent mille et une choses sur le monde qui les entoure et sur les valeurs qui se cachent au fond d'eux-mêmes.

Pam, Nico et Julie passent leurs étés au Camp Manitou. En plein cœur de la forêt boréale, ils renouent avec leurs racines franco-métisses et apprennent tout plein de choses fascinantes qui éveillent non seulement leurs cinq sens, mais aussi leur sensibilité pour les amener à se questionner, à résoudre des problèmes et à surmonter des défis. Les enfants développent ainsi la patience, la persévérance et l'humilité nécessaires pour vivre ensemble et collaborer au diapason de leur communauté. Tante Viola, sage guide des enfants et figure aimante et maternelle, est une magicienne et une guérisseuse qui incarne toute la sagesse ancestrale du peuple franco-métis.

Les personnages de Canot cocasse et leur langue, musique et aventures font écho à la vie quotidienne des jeunes franco-métis de l'Ouest canadien d'aujourd'hui et d'antan. Ciblant un auditoire jeunesse, la série vise à

Raven's Quest features first-person portraits of Indigenous kids from across the country. Each episode showcases a different child and their unique perspective on their day-to-day hobbies, their talents, and First Nations, Métis or Inuit practices. This season's adventures include: racing war canoes and going for a quad ride in Ladysmith, BC; honouring the water in a special ceremony and jingle dress dancing in London, ON; playing the fiddle using the "Métis broken style" and growing giant pumpkins in Camperville, MB; living off the land and decorating seashells on an island off Tofino, BC; and smudging before a tobacco ceremony and racing in the pool in Montreal, QC!

Kids can learn more about Indigenous cultures by playing the online game featuring the Raven. Players must complete quests to help their animal friends retrieve the missing objects that the Raven has hidden in their communities.

The Spirit Bear Collection




Grades 6-12 2020- 2023 22-26 min each First Nations Child and Family Caring Society of Canada

Based on true stories and the Spirit Bear picture books, these stop motion films by award-winning Michif artist Amanda Strong and executive director Cindy Blackstock. Learn how Spirit Bear and the children stand up for equity for First Nations children, how to learn from the past, and how we can all work together to fulfill the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action.

Spirit Bear videos come with a wealth of print resources including eBooks, Learning Guides and information sheets.



Spirit Bear's first film, Spirit Bear and Children Make History (26 min, 2020) tells the story of Spirit Bear hopping a train to Ottawa and banding together with children and animals to end injustice against First Nations children at the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal. Based on a real case that resulted in Canada being ordered to end its discriminatory underfunding of services for First Nations kids, this film was made especially for children, but is essential viewing for all Canadians.



Spirit Bear is off on another adventure in his second film, Spirit Bear: Fishing for Knowledge, Catching Dreams (22 min, 2022). Follow Spirit Bear as he learns about traditional knowledge and Residential Schools from Uncle Huckleberry and his friend Lak'insxw before heading to Algonquin territory, where children teach him about Shannen's Dream. Spirit Bear and his new friends won't stop until Shannen's Dream of "safe and comfy schools" comes true for every First Nations student.



Spirit Bear: Honouring Memories, Plantitng Dreams (22 min, 2023) visits Algonquin territory where he meets Jake, a friendly dog with a bag full of paper hearts attached to wood stakes. Jake tells Spirit Bear that school children and residential school survivors will plant the hearts when a big report on residential schools called the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) is shared. The TRC will have Calls to Action so we can all help end the unfairness and make sure this generation of First Nations,




After more than a decade as a Bearrister, Spirit Bear needs a vacation – and he's taking his family and friends with him! In Spirit Bear: Echoes of the Past (26 min, 2024), Spirit Bear travels to Songhees and Esquimalt territories (Victoria, BC) and witnesses a statue of John A. Macdonald, Canada's first Prime Minister, being removed from the steps of Victoria City Hall. Some people want to save the statue, and others are glad to see it going, prompting Spirit Bear to ask: What does it mean to reconcile history?

At 15 years old, Autumn Peltier, the Anishinabek Nation chief water commissioner, had already spent half of her life fighting for water. Motivated by stories of children growing up without access to drinkable tap water and elders forced to walk every day to claim water rations, Autumn embarked on a mission to bring clean drinking water to Indigenous communities across Canada. Directed by James Burns, the film follows Autumn's journey from Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory, on Manitoulin Island, to the United Nations General Assembly in New York City as she fights for the rights of Indigenous communities across Canada.

Adding to the richness of the storytelling, the filmmakers incorporate Michif (Métis) artist Christi Belcourt's renowned paintings, brought to life with stunning animated sequences that capture the sacred qualities of water.

Josephine Mandamin - The Anishinaabe Woman Who Walked for Water Rights

Treaty Road Series Explores the signing of the Numbered Treaties in Canada

"Treaty Road" follows Saxon de Cocq and Erin Goodpipe as they examine the role that Saxon's ancestor played in the numbered treaty negotiations. They travel the old roads to uncover the truth about the signing of these controversial documents The series explores the history & present day state of the Numbered Treaties in Canada between the Crown and Indigenous Peoples, from a very personal & unique point of view.

Episode 1 – Surrender the Land

Erin and Saxon begin their journey of discovery on Treaty 1 territory in Manitoba. They learn how the concept of land surrender was obscured by the Crown's manipulation.

Episode 2 – Justice

Erin and Saxon visit Treaty 2 territory and find out how people were forcibly displaced from their homes in the creation of a national park.

Episode 3 - Water

In Treaty 3 territory, Erin and Saxon learn about the ongoing struggle to protect the water from contamination. They visit a blockade in Grassy Narrows, ON, where a woman poisoned by mercury explains environmental racism.

Episode 4 – Education

Erin becomes a mother and visits her homelands on Treaty 4 territory in Saskatchewan. She and Saxon walk through the remains of a residential school and learn about the push to honour the memory of children whose lives were lost at residential schools.

Episode 5 – Food Sovereignty

Erin and Saxon find out how Treaty 5 limited people's ability to feed their communities. The duo learns how innovative gardeners in Norway House, Man., provide greens year-round, and land-based learning brings them out onto the ice.

Episode 6 – Resistance

As the buffalo near extinction, the Plains Indigenous People struggle to survive, but they add a medicine chest clause to Treaty 6 to try to protect their health. The Indian Act is pushed through and undermines any rights enshrined in the treaties.

Four Rivers Drone Program

Over the summer of 2021 the Four Rivers Group undertook an ambitious project to certify members of our team through Transport Canada as drone pilots with Advanced Operations status. This involved intense written exams, flight practice, and final flight testing in addition to the development from the ground up of safe operational procedures for our Four Rivers drone fleet. Today, Four Rivers is the home to 6 drone pilots with advanced operations. Since 2011, Four Rivers has been providing environmental services to the nine Matawa member First Nation communities.




Lorsque la Première Guerre mondiale éclate en 1914, le 90th Winnipeg Rifles est l'un des premiers régiments à qui on demande de former un bataillon pour le Corps expéditionnaire canadien. Ils ont été surnommés les Petits diables noirs pendant la rébellion du Nord-Ouest de 1885 par la résistance métisse vaincue et ils ont amené Louis Riel à Regina où il a été jugé et pendu pour trahison. Ainsi, lorsque le train de troupes s'arrête à Fort William pour aller chercher des recrues du Nord-Ouest de l'Ontario, tout le monde est surpris d'apprendre qu'un parent de Louis Riel s'est joint aux Little Black Devils. Patrick (Paddy) Riel est devenu l'un des meilleurs

tireurs d'élite du Canada. Son histoire, comme beaucoup des autres 60 000 Canadiens qui ont perdu la vie dans le conflit, a été perdue dans le temps. Ses descendants savaient qu'il était mort en héros, mais ils savaient peu de choses sur lui. The Sniper raconte l'histoire de Patrick Riel et de la famille qu'il a laissée derrière lui.

The Sniper

Grades 9-12 2023 29:41 min Film Riel Inc.

When WWI broke out in 1914, the 90th Winnipeg Rifles were one of the first regiments asked to form a battalion for the Canadian Expeditionary Force. They were nicknamed The Little Black Devils during the 1885 North-West Rebellion by the defeated Métis resistance and they brought Louis Riel to Regina where he was tried and hanged for treason. So, when the troop train stopped in Fort William to pick up recruits from Northwestern Ontario, everyone was surprised to learn that one of Louis Riel's relatives had joined the Little Black Devils. Patrick (Paddy) Riel became one of Canada's top snipers. His story, like too many of the 60,000 other Canadians who lost their lives in the conflict, was lost in time. His descendants knew he had died a hero, but they knew little else about him. The Sniper tells the story of Patrick Riel and the family he left behind.



Tecumseh

Grades 7-12 2024 16 mins Cher Obediah

Tecumseh is a short documentary about a historical hero who had the future in mind. Immersed in the Indigenous way he navigated a colonizer mindset to reimagine the landscape of Turtle Island. His leadership and efforts were cut short but the spirit of his vision lives on with hope for a peaceful path forward.

Tecumseh died on a battlefield just 80 kilometers away from London. The historical consequences of his actions for Southwestern Ontario, and Canada as a whole, are extensive: without his efforts

in the War of 1812, Canada as we know it would not still exist today.



The Snipers

Grades 9-12 2024 14 min ResearchTV Inc. *The Snipers* is a film that uses animation and archival footage to tell the story of Patrick Riel and Phil MacDonald, distinguished members of the 90th Winnipeg Rifles in WWI. A eulogy is given for Tommy Prince, Canada's most-decorated Indigenous war veteran. Tommy Prince of the Brokenhead Ojibway Nation is one of the most-decorated Indigenous war veterans in Canada, having been awarded a total of 11 medals for his service in the Second World War and the Korean War. When he died, he was honoured at his funeral by his First Nation, the province of Manitoba, Canada and the governments of France, Italy and the United States.

rivers flow." In this documentary, *Haida filmmamker Heather Hatch* documents the protests and legal challenges to Site C.

Depth of Field Series: Films About Farming

Depth of Field is a series of short documentaries showcasing Canadian farmers and farm workers, and their sustainable farming practices on and off the land. Rotational grazing, seed saving, building healthy soils, and working for social justice—different farmers highlight their own priorities and, together, these unscripted films tell the story of farming practices that would create the food system we all want.

Indigenous-focused episodes include:

Ga Gitigemi Gamik (We Will Plant Lodge) - Manitouline Island, ON

Features the beginning of Ga Gitigemi Gamik (We Will Plant Lodge), a planned ecological centre on a permanent Indigenous-stewarded site on Manitoulin Island, Ontario, where women and 2SLGBTTQQIA+ persons can work on the land together and (re) learn ancestral agricultural methods lost to colonization. The documentary provides insight into the efforts to revitalize traditional agricultural knowledge, emphasizing the importance of cultural sustainability in farming.

Gitigaanes Anishinaabe Urban Micro-Farm - Toronto, ON

Gitigaanes is an urban Anishinaabe microfarm in Toronto. This film showcases indigenous food, growing methods, and the benefits of urban farms.

Backwoods Buffalo Ranch - Mayerthorpe, AB

"The Backwoods Buffalo Ranch" is named after the farmers' Metis heritage and the bluff of beautiful spruce in the "backwoods". They raise Bison, pastured pork, free-range chickens, horses and milking animals. This film focuses on their farm operations and discusses the importance of animal welfare and rural communities.

4C Farms - Cowessess First Nation, SK

4C Farms is owned by Cowessess First Nation in Grayson, SK. It is a mixed cattle and grain operation with 2,500 acres of pasture and hayland, and 5,000 acres of canola, peas, wheat, and oats. The film showcases how they are growing their farming business to create economic opportunities in the agriculture sector for First Nations by farming their own land in a sustainable manner.

McCreary Land and Livestock Ltd - Bladworth, SK

McCreary Land and Livestock Ltd is a grain and livestock operation that uses renewable energy and significant reductions in nitrogen fertilizer. This film showcases sustainable fertilizer use, climate change, and farmer relationships with First Nations.

Back to Roots follows home cook Perry Omeasoo on his personal journey towards better health as he demonstrates modified versions of traditional Indigenous games and skill training. Along the way, he showcases his culinary skills and whips up tasty dishes inspired by the origins of these traditional Indigenous games. The adventurous series covers everything from Cheyenne kickball to Ulladulla spear-throwing and from Mongolian dumplings to Cree venison stew.

Episode 1- Just Ducky

Perry and Chef Denia visually hunt for ducks while Chef Denia advises Perry on wild mushrooms and the benefits of muskeg. Perry prepares muskeg and mint tea for them to enjoy as they discuss ingredients and upcoming recipes.

Episode 2- A Brisket, A Basket

Chef Denia is gifted a bison brisket and offers to cook it for Perry. They forage for wild mint and discuss the herb's benefits.

Episode 3- There's No Misteakin'

Perry and Chef Denia do a visual hunt for elk. Chef Denia shows Perry where she forages wild raspberries. Perry makes a raspberry mimosa mocktail for them to enjoy as they discuss ingredients and upcoming recipes.

Episode 4- Spruced Up

Perry and Chef Denia forage for spruce needles and wild mint to pair with a rack of lamb. Perry makes spruce needle iced tea for them to enjoy as they discuss ingredients and upcoming recipes.

Episode 5- What A Boar!

Perry and Chef Denia do a visual hunt for wild boar while Chef Denia explains its invasive nature. They also forage and chat about cattail greens, dandelion greens and fireweed.

Episode 6- Moose, Meese, Yes Please

Perry and Chef Denia do a visual hunt for moose. Chef Denia shares her moose hunting techniques and the best times to hunt. They forage for stinging nettle, wild cranberries and discuss tapping birch trees.

Episode 7- Cacciatore Me If You Can!

Perry and Chef Denia set up a rabbit snare. Chef Denia shares memories of snaring, trapping and eating rabbit. They forage for and chat about wild blueberries.

Episode 8- How CharCUTErie is That?

Chef Denia surprises Perry with an elk tenderloin to cook together. They forage for wild cranberries, wild mushrooms and yarrow. Perry prepares a wild cranberry and yarrow mocktail for them to enjoy while discussing ingredients and recipes.

Chef Denia announces she has an elk tenderloin for them to cook. The two forage wild cranberries, wild mushrooms and yarrow. Perry makes a wild cranberry and yarrow mocktail for the two of them to enjoy and discusses the ingredients

INDIGENOUS ENTREPRENEURSHIP



Northern Air Rescue

Grades 9-12 2024 13 episodes x 22 min each Animiki See Distribution

Born from the need to transport people from remote Indigenous communities, Missinippi Airways is a small 100% Indigenous-owned Manitoba airline that provides air ambulance, passenger and cargo services to the North. "Northern Air Rescue" documents life inside this unique airline that is a vital lifeline to Indigenous communities, providing access to critical medical care, transportation, and economic opportunities.

Episode 1- Welcome to Missinippi Airways

Welcome to one of Canada's few 100% First Nation owned airlines. Operating in some of Canada's most challenging aviation conditions, a young pilot fresh out of flight school takes off on her first exciting adventure with Missinippi Airways.

Episode 2- A Mom First, Then a Pilot

Follow a medivac flight crew as they work through a demanding 13-day rotation. While the crew responsibilities are challenging enough, for captain and single mom Robyn Shlachetka, balancing the needs of two young daughters adds to the demands.

Episode 3- Mechanics to the Rescue

Harsh weather and gravel runways make flights difficult for pilots and their planes. When one medivac plane suffers a mechanical issue, Missinippi Airways' maintenance team swings into action, swapping parts and equipment to prepare a replacement plane.

Episode 4- A First Nation and a First Officer

After a year honing her aviation skills on a passenger service to Pukatawagan, a young pilot tries to earn her spot in Missinippi Airways' air ambulance program.

Episode 5- At the Mercy of Mother Nature

At Grace Lake Airport, low-lying fog is grounding Missinippi Airways' flights to Pukatawagan. With customers and baggage backing up in the terminal, pilots and customer service reps wait patiently for the weather to improve.

Episode 6 - Moving Up the Ranks

As a small Indigenous-owned airline, Missinippi Airways' success depends on training pilots who can handle the unique challenges of northern aviation. However, retaining pilots can be challenging when you're competing against the lure of big airlines.

Episode 7- A New Pilot Gets His Wings

Flight training is a team effort, conducted under the watchful eye of management and experienced pilots. Starting in the dispatch centre in Winnipeg, new pilots wait for the call that takes them from a desk job into the Missinippi Airways cockpits.

Episode 8- When Winter Arrives

In northern Manitoba, flying through bad weather and poor visibility is part of life. However, when the first winter storm hits the Grace Lake terminal, Missinippi Airways encounters a whole new set of aviation challenges.

Episode 9- Keeping the Runway Open

For Missinippi Airways, maintaining their Grace Lake runway is essential to keeping their passenger and medivac fleet in the air. But when the deep freeze arrives in this part of Canada, planes and machinery start to break down.

Episode 10- Growing Pains

After a record number of medivac flights this year, Missinippi Airways is expanding, but with this growth comes a few growing pains. Inspired by the airline's evolution, senior management decides to rebrand their fleet of planes.

Episode 11- A Lifeline to the North

A cold snap impairs railway service from The Pas to Pukatawagan, so Missinippi Airways becomes the only way for people to get in or out of their community. An Indigenous medivac captain returns to Missinippi and flies a demanding rotation with a new crew.

Episode 12- A Medivac Captain is Born

At Missinippi Airways, medivac pilots do much more than fly planes. When a job-related injury sidelines one of their crew members, a talented young pilot earns her shot at moving up to the medivac program.

Episode 13- A Departure and an Arrival

With the surprising resignation of one of Missinippi Airways' senior managers, others line up seeking an opportunity for advancement. Later, a new first officer arrives from South America and gets a crash course in the unique challenges of northern aviation.
