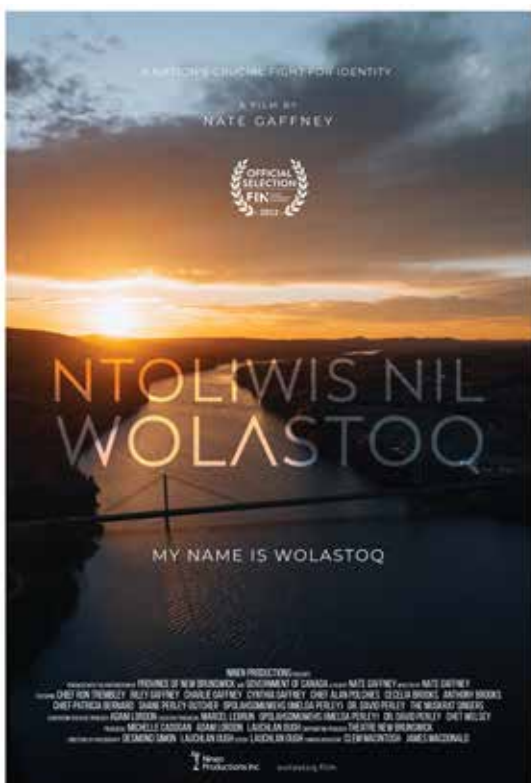

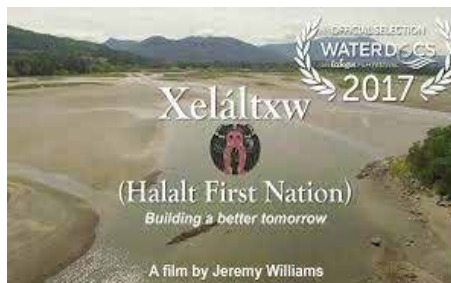

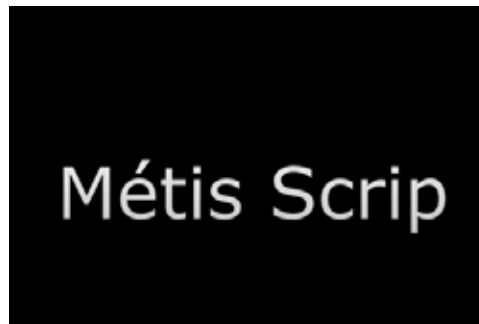

In 1849, a force of warriors and Anishinaabeg forced the Quebec and Lake Superior Mining Association to stop operating a mine and led to the signing of the Robinson treaty. These early incidents were the "dress rehearsals" for the Métis resistance on the Prairies. Led by Louis Riel, the Métis sought to maintain their rights. The Red River Rebellion was the first crisis the new federal government faced after Confederation. In the aftermath, the Dominion Land Act paved the way for the infamous scrip system in an ineffectual attempt to extinguish the land rights of Métis.

Corn husk dolls have been made by Indigenous people probably since the beginnings of corn agriculture more than a thousand years ago. Brittle dried cornhusks become soft if soaked in water and produce finished dolls sturdy enough for children's toys. 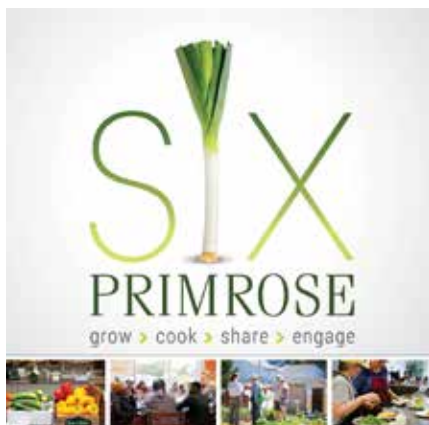

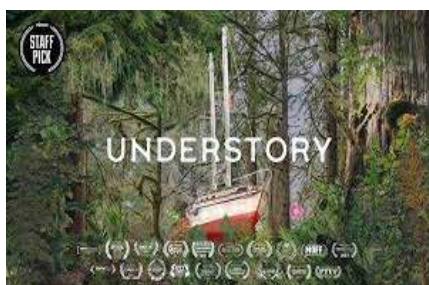

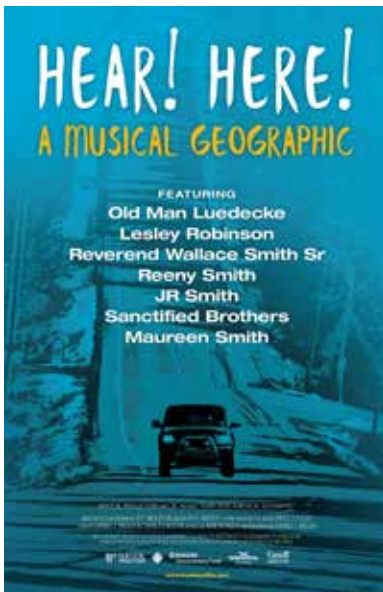
