

Indigenous Tourism and Art in Southeastern Ontario: From Seeing Canada (Season 4)

Canadian Journalist Brandy Yanchyk heads to southeastern Ontario. She meets the rare and endangered Ojibwe Spirit Horses at the Mādahòki Farm in Nepean, Ontario. This is the only known breed of horse indigenous to Canada. The farm's Legacy Trail is a self-guided medicine walk and their marketplace supports local Indigenous small businesses and artists. Brandy learns to make a corn husk doll, a Haudenosaunee tradition that dates back thousands of years. Brittle dried cornhusks become soft if soaked in water and produce finished dolls sturdy enough for children's toys.

Near Cornwall, Ontario, at the international Akwesasane Mohawk Nation ('land where the partridge drums'), you can get guided tours of several museums, learn lacrosse stick making and basket making, and eat in local restaurants. Brandy learns how to make traditional corn bread.

At the Agnes Etherington Art Centre in Kingston, Ontario, Brandy meets Guatemalan-born painter and performance artist Francisco Corbett.

The documentary delivers a hard-hitting reality check for viewers unfamiliar with the Sixties Scoop, providing insight into the policies that were created to separate Indigenous children from their heritage, and the systems that continue to dismantle Indigenous families today. *Coming Home* is the feature directorial debut from Cree/Ojibway filmmaker, Erica Daniels of Peguis First Nation.

From 1951 to 1984, the Sixties Scoop was an assimilation project led by Canadian federal and provincial governments that attempted to erase Indigenous identity. More than 20,000 Indigenous children were forcefully taken from their families, and displaced into foster care systems throughout North America and abroad.

Daniels crafts a visual tapestry to evoke a profound sense of homecoming related to family, culture, traditions, values, community and connection to the land. The communities of Brokenhead Ojibway Nation and Sioux Valley Dakota Nation are at the heart of this documentary.

Coming Home entwines profound interviews of personal recollections from Sixties Scoop survivors, accompanied by glimpses of on-set moments of the *Little Bird* drama series and archival footage from news sources. The layering of these elements creates a rich and emotional exploration of the devastating impacts the Sixties Scoop has had on Indigenous peoples, and the creative team's essential work of narrative reclamation through storytelling from an Indigenous lens.

Merchants of the Wild is an ongoing series filmed in various locations across Canada. It mixes survival, nature and adventure, as six indigenous adventurers learn what it takes to complete a fur trade mission similar to the ones their ancestors would have endured in Canada over 400 years ago.

Travelling in birch bark canoes, the brave group is taught by Elders and 'Knowledge Keepers', learning to make tools and use skills passed on orally through generations. These teachings are essential to their survival, as they take to the land with no modern technology on a voyage that will leave them forever changed.
